

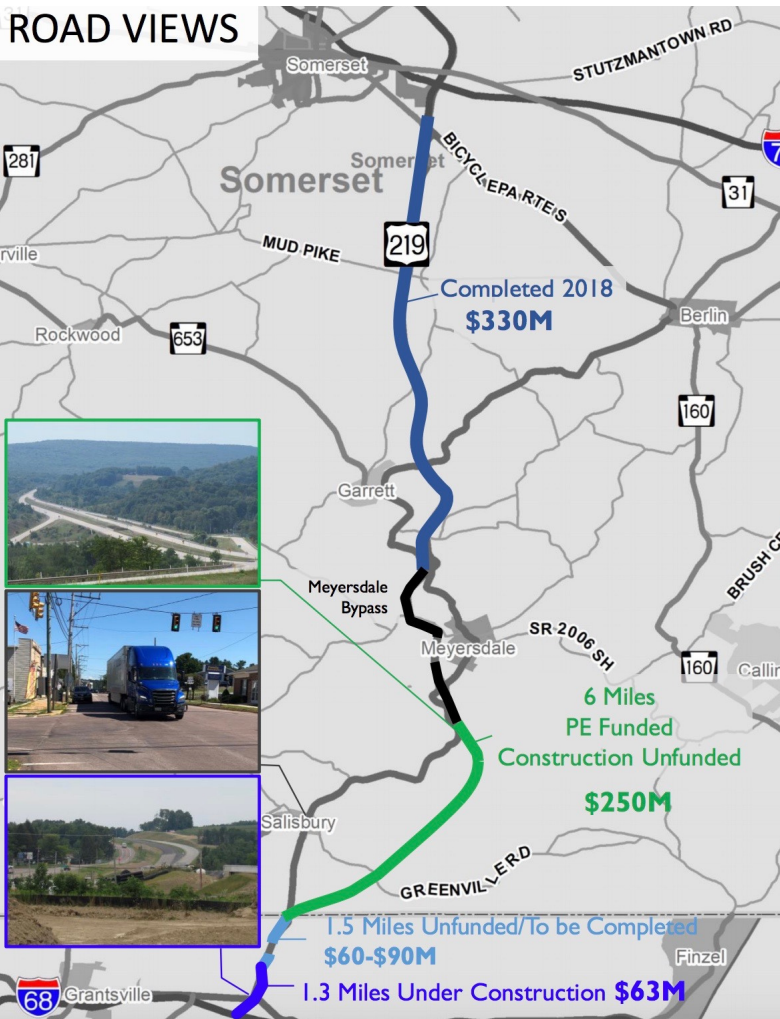


TGCC Awarded 2020 Outstanding Rural Economic Development Award

US 219 Work Group Celebrates Important Wins

Our US 219 Work Group achieved many milestones in 2020 and leveraged nearly \$120,000 in investment. MDOT SHA funded a Cost Benefit Analysis related to a completed US 219 at a cost of \$42,000 and under the direction of Brandon Peters, Transportation Program Manager, and Brandon Carson, Director of Planning & Community Development, Southern Alleghenies Planning & Development Commission secured a \$75,000 ARC grant to fund an Economic Impact Study. The findings of that study confirmed that the completion of US 219 will “increase safety of all vehicles and offer a faster travel route that reduces overall transportation costs, as well as provides significant benefits to the region’s economy.” Following the completion of these two studies, Pennsylvania Secretary of Transportation, Yassmin Gramian, announced that Pennsylvania will fund \$6M for the preliminary engineering studies needed for the remaining 6 miles of US 219 between Meyersdale and the PA state line. This funding commitment is a critical next step in moving this project forward and we are working with MDOT SHA to seek a similar commitment to fund preliminary engineering for Maryland’s remaining 1.5 mile section.

In addition, 1.3 miles of the US 219 Bypass near Grantsville, Maryland will be completed within the coming weeks. This investment of \$63M created a direct impact of 54 new construction jobs as well as indirect impacts of 17 jobs and the procurement of materials and supplies manufactured domestically by US workers and hauled to the project by US truckers.

Pamela Tokar-Ickes is the Secretary of the Somerset County Board of Commissioners. Appointed following the 2019 Spring Primary to fill a vacancy created by the death of the late John Vatajuk, she returned to public office after serving as Director of the Somerset County Endowments for the Community Foundation for the Alleghenies. Tokar-Ickes served four consecutive terms as a Somerset County Commissioner from 2000 through 2015.

Throughout her professional career, Tokar-Ickes has served as a member of numerous boards and community organizations with missions ranging from substance abuse prevention, human services, economic development, library services and historic preservation.

She has received awards and recognitions including the Governor's Award for Excellence for her assistive role in creating Pennsylvania's Human Services Block Grant and was named the Outstanding Commissioner of the Year in 2015 by the County Commissioners' Association of Pennsylvania. During her long tenure as a member of CCAP's Board of Directors, Tokar-Ickes was instrumental in creating a statewide leadership program for County Commissioners that will train emerging county leaders during the next decade.

A 1979 graduate of Somerset Area High School, Tokar-Ickes attended the University of Pittsburgh. She is a founding board member and past Chief Volunteer Officer of the nationally affiliated Boys and Girls Club of Somerset County, Inc. and currently serves as the Board Chair of the United Way of the Laurel Highlands and as the President of the Historical and Genealogical Society of Somerset County.
